Day 1

Wednesday, January 17th 2024

Day 3 Friday, January 19th 2024

We pack our bags and head to Dakshinchitra Heritage Museum, an unusual, living open-air museum. Walk through the 18 traditional houses here to get a flavour of the different cultures of south India. We will have an exclusive interaction with the architect of the museum, Dr Benny Kuriakose.

Later today, we move to Mamallapuram (formerly Mahabalipuram) a UNESCO World Heritage Site renowned for its rock-cut shrines, ancient sculptures, and temples from the 6th-9th cent CE. To walk us through the meanings in the monuments, we have the scholar, art historian Gayathri Iyer.

Our hotel in Mamallapuram is Radisson Blu, a charming beachfront property.

Day 4


Saturday, January 20th 2024

Spend the day exploring Mamallapuram's cave temples, the massive and dramatic relief sculpture known as Arjuna's Penance, a 1,800-year-old temple that was uncovered by a tsunami, and the Shore Temple which stands overlooking the sea. In the evening, we visit a traditional stone sculptor's workshop (to be confirmed)

Day 5

Sunday, January 21st 2024


Experience the antiquity of the 7th century Kailasanathar Temple complex and the Vaikuntha Perumal Temple in Kanchipuram, famous for their animated carvings depicting scenes from Hindu mythology. Art historian Gayathri Iyer will accompany us to explain what we see. Enjoy a hearty and delicious south Indian lunch and visit a weaver's workshop to watch the transformation of silk yarn into dazzling silk sarees.

We move to Pondicherry and stay at The Promenade Hotel.

Day 6 Monday, January 22nd 2024

A rest and leisure day for you at Pondicherry, a coastal town that is a charming blend of French and Indian cultures. We suggest strolls through the French Quarter, the Tamil Quarter and sampling some of the town's many quaint little cafes. In the evening, scholar Anirudh Kanisetti who will deliver a lecture on The Cholas.





Day 7 Tuesday, January 23rd 2024

Scholar Anirudh Kanisetti will walk us through the temple in Chidambaram, home of Nataraja, the Cosmic Dancer. It is famous for its gold-plated superstructure, bronze idols, numerous halls, temple tanks and for its depictions of traditional south Indian dance.

Later today, we visit the 11th century Brihadeshwara Temple in Gangaikondacholapuram, a part of the Great Living Chola Temples UNESCO World Heritage Site. We will also stop by at an excavation site where archaeologists have unearthed the remains of a Chola palace.

In the evening, we have a second lecture by Anirudh Kanisetti on the Cholas. Tonight's stay is at Cholaa Dynasty Hotel, Kumbakonam.

Day 8 Wednesday, January 24th 2024

This morning, we visit the gorgeously carved Airavatesvara Temple in Darasuwram, also part of the Great Living Chola Temples UNESCO World Heritage Site. After a traditional South Indian lunch, we will visit a workshop Swamimalai to see the intricacies of making bronze idols through the lost-wax process.

Our stay tonight is at the Great Trails Riverview Resort in Thanjavur, which is situated on the banks of a river.

On the cards today: Thanjavur, the erstwhile Chola capital that is still a hub of Tamil culture. We visit the Thanjavur palace complex, wander through its grand Audience Hall, explore the Chola bronzes in the palace museum and drop in at the Saraswati Mahal library to look at its collection of manuscripts. We have lunch in a local restaurant. We meet painters who work in the traditional Thanjavur style of painting, which among other things, uses gold foil. And we marvel with scholar Anirudh Kanisetti at the gigantic Brihadeshwara Temple, also known as the Big Temple, built in 1010 CE, a part of the Great Living Chola Temples UNESCO World Heritage Site.

Day 10 Friday, January 26th 2024

Hobnob with the scion of the erstwhile ruler of Thanjavur today (subject to his availability). Later, we drive to Srirangam, where we wander through the labyrinthine Ranganathaswamy temple (dedicated to Vishnu), one of the world's largest functioning temple complexes.

Our stay in Trichy will be at the Courtyard by Marriott.

Day 11 Saturday, January 27th 2024

If time permits we will make an early morning visit to Rangathaswamy Temple before heading to the airport. We catch a flight to Kochi in the state of Kerala, deservedly tag-lined God's Own Country! We stay at The Malabar House (or similar), a boutique heritage hotel with a history going back to 1755.

Sunday, 28th January 2024

Our morning excursion takes us to Cheraman Mosque, one of India's oldest mosques that, according to local lore, was built during the Prophet's time. We will visit Paravur synagogue, built in 1615, to see a beautiful blend of Kerala-style architecture with Jewish traditions. We will also see Dutch-influenced Kerala architecture at the 17-18th century Paliam Palace.

In the evening, a lecture by historian Dr PJ Cherian on the flourishing Indo-Roman trade 2000 years ago at the port of Muziris aka Pattanam, a village near Kochi.

Day 13

Monday, 29th January 2024

Enjoy a relaxed morning in Kochi. We suggest a wander around the Fort Kochi area which is dotted with cafes, beautiful bungalows and venerable old trees. Later in the day, we catch a flight to Bangalore where we will check in at West End Hotel, a 136-year-old heritage property with a deep and varied history.

Tuesday, 30th January 2024

This morning, we head over to the Museum of Art and Photography to see its collection of photography, digital art and objects from India and elsewhere in South Asia, dating from the 10th century to today. After lunch at a local restaurant, we have a private gathering at a collector's home to see his vast collection of tribal carpets from countries along the Silk Roads. And then its time for a private celebratory dinner at the 140-year-old Bowring Club.

Wednesday, 31st January 2024

We head out of Bangalore to the lands of the Hoysala kings, to see the 12th century Chennakeshava temple in Belur, known for its ornate sculpture and for its unusual stellate plan. Our stay tonight is at Hoysala Village Resort, Hassan.

A morning visit to Halebidu (25 km, drive time 35 minutes) to see the stunning 12th century Hoysaleshwara temple, known for its walls which are completely clothed in sculpture. We will also visit a 12th century Jain temple in the same town. Later, we head back to Bangalore to the West End.



ABOUT THE SCHOLARS AND EXPERTS

Dr. Sharada Sriniyasan

Dr Sharada Sriniyasan is a Professor in the National Institute of Advanced Studies, Bengaluru. She is an archeologist researching ancient mining, archaeometallurgy and archeological sciences. Prof. Srinivasan has made pioneering contributions by exploring engineering applications in the materials characterization of archaeological metals, early ferrous and non-ferrous metallurgy and artisanal technologies. She has written extensively on archeometric characterization and finger-printing of metal artefacts and prized South Indian and Chola metal icons using frontline lead isotope ratio geo-chemistry and analysis and the early use of leaded bronze, brass and metallic zinc. She received the Padma Shri award of the Government of India for her work in Archeology in 2019. She was elected as International Honorary Member of American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 2021. She is Fellow of Royal Asiatic Society of Great Britain and Ireland. She is also an accomplished Bharatanatvam dancer.

Gayathri Iyer

Gayathri Iyer is an art historian and a Bharatanatyam dancer with a special interest in the Abhinaya tradition of the Kalanidhi Narayanan style. She has trained under Bragha Bessell, Vigneshwary Jeyagandhi and Minal Prabhu of Kalakshetra. Upon completion of a Master's Degree in Arts and Aesthetics with a specialisation in Bharatanatyam in the context of Visual Arts, Theatre and Cinema, she obtained an MPhil in Indian Art History from Jawaharlal Nehru University (JNU), New Delhi. She is currently working on her PhD under the art historian Prof Naman Ahuja.

Dr. Benny Kuriakose

Dr Benny Kuriakose is an architect and designer known for his work on sustainable architecture. He is the founder of Benny Kuriakose and Associates, an architect and consulting company in Chennai, India. He received the Charles Wallace India Trust Award for a Master's degree in Conservation Studies from the University of York, UK, and earned his PhD from the Indian Institute of Technology in Madras, India. Benny is more for his work for the design of the public buildings and the transplantation of the buildings in the Dakshinachitra heritage village in Chennai. Major architectural works include the Muziris Heritage Project in Kochi, the design of the tsunami-affected villages of Chinnangudi, and Tarangambadi in Nagapattinam District, and others. Benny has offered his services as a consultant to UNDP, UNESCO, various State Governments, and other organizations.

Anirudh Kanisetti

Anirudh Kanisetti is a history researcher and writer. He is the author of the critically acclaimed Lords of the Deccan: Southern India from the Chalukyas to the Cholas, presenting a new history of early medieval India. He has received grants from the Princeton Center for Digital Humanities and the India Foundation for the Arts and his writing has been featured in The Hindu, The New Indian Express, LiveMint, and The Print, among others.

Dr PJ Cherian is a historian, former Director of the Kerala Council for Historical Research and is now director of the PAMA Institute for the Advancement of Transdisciplinary Archaeological Sciences.
